The cooperative programs are administered and implemented through a partnership between the State of Mississippi, the USDA Forest Service and many other private and government entities. These programs promote the health and productivity of forest lands and rural economies. Emphasis focuses on forest sustainability and the production of commodity and amenity values such as wildlife, water quality and environmental services.

- The goal is to maintain and improve the health of urban and rural forests and related economies. These programs: Increase cost effectiveness through the use of partnerships in delivery; Increase values through sustained productivity of forests; Are voluntary, and use non-regulatory approaches.

Key Issues:

- Mississippi continues to recover from the impacts of Hurricane Katrina, including increased fuel loads across the state. Due to the additional fuels, fires are burning more intensely and control efforts are greatly hampered. The fire situation requires larger and heavier dozers than those normally used by the state and also a greater reliance on aviation assets.
- Addressing hurricane damage including increased southern pine beetle prevention activities, and cogongrass control efforts.

Program Highlights:

Forest Health Protection

Southern pine beetle populations declined in 2006 and are now extremely low. However, Ips bark beetle-associated pine mortality increased greatly due to summer drought and the effects of Hurricane Katrina. Southern pine beetle prevention treatments were carried out on about 3,000 acres.

Cooperative Fire Protection

State Fire Assistance provides funding to support fire fighting resources throughout Mississippi, including the development of Community Wildfire Protection Plans. The Federal Excess Personal Property Program assists Mississippi in acquiring and placing fire equipment in rural communities throughout the state. In addition, Mississippi Forestry Commission administers Volunteer Fire Assistance Program funds to support the fire prevention and protection efforts of rural community fire departments.

Economic Action

The Mississippi Forestry Commission continues efforts that at promoting forest-based

economic development, including bio-fuels production and biomass utilization.

Forest Legacy

The State Forest Stewardship Coordinating Committee completed the Assessment of Need identifying environmentally important forest lands threatened to conservation to non forest use. We anticipate the first funded project to occur in FY2009.

Landowner Assistance

Increased funding in the Forest Lands Enhancement Program (FLEP) and Stewardship has resulted in a significant increase in the number of acres under management and the number of landowners receiving technical assistance.

Urban and Community Forestry

Through the USDA Forest Service funding that the MFC received, a financial assistance program was developed to help communities assess and recover their "green infrastructure" that was lost through the hurricane. They are focusing on four main areas: urban tree replacement on public spaces; tree risk remediation (conducting assessments to identify hazardous trees and allow their removal; information and education on better tree care, risk assessment, identification, and mitigation measures along with developing storm preparedness; and, conducting tree inventories of the remaining trees and allowing pruning and removals based on the their condition.

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
